### 14.D - APPROVAL OF CHEMICAL PURCHASES FOR WATER AND WASTEWATER TREATMENT FOR FISCAL YEAR 2018-2019 (Public Works Director)

This action allows the City to purchase chemicals necessary for water and wastewater treatment for Fiscal Year 2018-2019. Since 1994, Benicia and other agencies in and around Solano, Napa, and Yolo counties have used the North Bay Agency Chemical Pool to obtain the best possible pricing through bulk purchasing. Sufficient funds have been budgeted in the operations accounts of the water treatment and wastewater treatment divisions to cover these costs.

### 14.F - AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR STORM WATER MANAGEMENT & FLOOD MITIGATION PLAN (Public Works Director)

Storm water management is a critical municipal responsibility. The effectiveness and efficiency of storm water management have direct impact on public health and safety, surface water quality, environmental habitat, and future development. The Storm Water Management and Flood Mitigation Plan provides a roadmap for the City to manage and improve its infrastructure to provide flood protection for the City. The findings of the Storm Water Management and Flood Mitigation Plan provide the basis for recommendations on the City's flood management policy, land use planning, and coordination with other City infrastructure management iniatives.

### 14.I - AWARD OF CONTRACT FOR STREET LIGHT AND FACILITY LIGHT MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR SERVICES (Public Works Director)

The City owns more than 2,000 street lights and is also responsible for maintaining park lighting, parking lot lighting and other city facility external lighting that requires monthly maintenance and repair services in order to ensure proper and safe operation. After conducting the required bid process, DC Electric Group, Inc. is being recommended to perform the work with a two-year contract. There is sufficient funding in the current fiscal year budget for the \$81,500, which is the cost of the two-year contract.

This report recommends entering into a contract for biosolids processing services for the Wastewater Treatment Plant. Biosolids (aka sludge) is the residual, semi-solid by-product of wastewater after it is treated. Currently, biosolids are disposed of at a landfill where it is used as cover material. The current contract for this service ends June 30, 2018. Starting in Fiscal Year 2018-19, City staff recommends transitioning to a new, environmentally-friendly method whereby the biosolids will be converted into a saleable bio-fertilizer product.

Adopt the resolution approving a five-year contract with Lystek International Limited for treatment of wastewater plant biosolids in the amount of \$68.50 per wet ton; and authorizing the City Manager to execute the contract on behalf of the City.

### 14.Q - AUTHORIZE GRANT AGREEMENT WITH DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE FOR YOUTH RELATED TOBACCO WORK (Police Chief)

Since 2002, the Police Department has been working to reduce the underage use of tobacco, alcohol and other drugs (ATOD) through their Benicia Youth Action Coalition. The Department has partnered and been awarded Solano County Health & Social Services Substance Abuse Grants since 2002. However, this year, the County's new ATOD RFP did not allow for any tobacco work, only alcohol and cannabis. Staff quickly determined in order to continue providing important tobacco reducing programs for our youth and the community, funds from the DOJ-Tobacco Grant Program were needed.

#### Recommendation:

Adopt a resolution authorizing the Benicia Police Department to enter into a contract with the California Department of Justice, to receive grant funding from the Tobacco-Prop 56 Grant, and authorizing the Chief of Police to sign the Memorandum of Understanding.

This resolution would authorize the submission to the qualified electors of the City an ordinance to establish an excise tax on commercial cannabis businesses at the maximum rate of \$10 per square foot of grow area and 6% of gross receipts for all other cannabis businesses. The proposed cannabis business excise tax is a general tax and requires a simple majority vote of the voters of the City. Revenue from the tax would accrue to the General Fund and be available for any lawful purpose authorized by the City Council, including municipal services such as police protection, fire prevention/suppression, emergency medical services, parks, recreation, and street maintenance.

### Recommendation:

Approve the resolution placing Ordinance No. 18-\_\_ on the ballot for the November 6, 2018 election. To meet the statutory requirements for placing this measure on the ballot two-thirds of the Council must approve the resolution. This equates to 4 council members voting to approve this resolution.
