Vice Mayor Young and Staff discussed the last replacement on this item (2012), the warranty on the line. Seeno installed a butterfly valve that has failed. For the City's best interest, it must be replaced. Council and Staff discussed whether it was the City's responsibility to pay for the replacement.

Mayor Patterson and Staff discussed whether this was the same line that had issues in the past. Staff confirmed it was the line that runs on the west side of I-680 that was attributed to the Seeno project in Cordelia. There were some cathodes installed incorrectly. She and Staff asked if this could be taken back to the City of Fairfield and Seeno. It is a good

valve, but not industrial rated. The valve only had a one-year warranty. She asked Staff to look into putting in a claim against Seeno.

Council Member Campbell and Staff discussed the issue of the City having no say on what goes in but being responsible for paying for repairs.

Vice Mayor Young asked Staff to clarify that Seeno wanted to repair the valve. Staff stated that Seeno wanted to be invited to give a proposal on repairing the valve. Staff chose not to use Seeno, as they didn't want the contractor who installed the valve come back and repair it at the City's cost. The City did not have a lot of say in the initial valve installation, as it is on an easement that runs through the City of Fairfield.

Mayor Patterson discussed her vote at the last meeting. She had concerns about the legality of what the City is doing. She would like this continued to a Closed Session. She discussed the noise two weeks ago on graduation night. She wants to get it right. She read her proposed changes (as listed in her email - copy on file). She was concerned regarding legal issues, which is why she wanted to continue this to a closed session. She disclosed exparté communications.

Council Member Hughes discussed his support for the current proposed ordinance. He did not want to continue or delay it. He supported Staff's recommendation.

Vice Mayor Young disclosed exparté communications. There are changes that could be made. He suggested reducing the hours on the weekends to 9:30 p.m. and allow for amplified music on Thursdays during farmers market until 9:30 p.m., and where a decibel measurement would happen in the event of a complaint (property line). He suggested it be measured at the site of the property where the music is being played rather than the site of the complainant.

Council Member Campbell asked Staff to clarify that this would have to be brought back for another second reading if substantial changes were made tonight.

- 4. Jon Van Landschoot Mr. Van Landschoot discussed concern regarding noise complaints and Staff's time addressing those complaints, enforcement, and how many complaints have to be registered before a permit is revoked.

- 5. Nancy Atkins Ms. Atkins clarified that the ordinance addressed recorded music as well as live music. She discussed concern regarding the loud levels of recorded music around town.

- 7. Andres Soto Mr. Soto discussed concern regarding restricting amplified music on Sundays.
- 8. Karen Burns Ms. Burns spoke in opposition to the proposed ordinance. She discussed concern regarding the lack of notification to surrounding neighbors.
- 9. Marilyn Bardet Ms. Bardet discussed concern regarding cumulative impacts. She discussed concern regarding leaf blowers.
- 10. Jason Buckingham Mr. Buckingham discussed decibel levels. He urged Council to keep the reasonable parts of the proposed ordinance and add the parts that were not discussed to it.
- 11. Ricky Greene Mr. Greene discussed concerns regarding noise complaints.
- 12. Mary Frances Kelly Poh Ms. Kelly Poh discussed special event permits, and how she enjoyed walking downtown last week hearing various music playing at several places.
- 13. Kathy Kerridge Ms. Kerridge objected to limiting music on Sundays.
- 14. Citizen the citizen objected to limiting amplified music on Sundays.
- 15. Citizen the citizen discussed concern regarding limiting amplified music.
- 16. Citizen the citizen discussed whether outdoor noise on restaurant patios would be limited because of the decibel levels.
- 17. Carl Lucca Mr. Lucca discussed the need to have viable downtown businesses.
- 18. Citizen the citizen stated there has been an increase in noise downtown since Lucca's opened.
- 19. Citizen the citizen spoke in support of the ordinance.
- 20. Citizen the citizen spoke in support for having the decibel reading taken at the property line of the venue when a complaint is made.

Council Member Schwartzman discussed support for having the decibel reading taken at the property line of the venue. He was okay with backing the level down to 80 db. He was fine with the hours as listed in the proposed ordinance, except for Sundays starting at 10:00 a.m. and stopping at 6:00 p.m. He did not have a problem with the amplified music.

Lorie Tinfow, City Manager, discussed concern regarding the level and number of changes being made at the dais. She requested Council allow Staff to review Council's direction and bring the changes back at a future meeting.

Vice Mayor Young made a motion to amend the ordinance by changing the hours to 9:30 p.m. on Fridays, Saturdays, and Thursdays (during farmers market season), change the decibel reading at the property line of the establishment, and prohibit amplified music before noon and no later than 6:00 p.m. on Sundays. He wants to make sure churches are not precluded from amplified music on Sunday. Mayor Patterson seconded the motion.

Council Member Hughes disagreed the decibel measurement should be taken at the property line of the venue. The only change he would agree to would be to reduce the time on Friday and Saturday from 10:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m.

Mayor Patterson clarified that the motion was to go to 9:30 p.m. Thursday (during Farmers Market season), Friday, and Saturday, modify Sundays with amplified music allowed 12:00 p.m.-6:00 p.m. Making those changes would force it to be brought back for another reading. She asked if the maker of the motion was willing to make an amendment, so it did not have to be brought back.

Vice Mayor Young stated he would like to maintain keeping the decibel reading at the site of the business when a complaint is made.

Council Member Hughes stated that it was clear to him that one of the businesses (Lucca's) would prefer to have the decibel reading taken from the property line of the person complaining, not at the business property line.

Council Member Campbell stated the issue of construction equipment being used on Sundays was not addressed in the motion. He and Staff discussed the decibel level readings table on page 336 of the agenda packet.

Mayor Patterson clarified that the motion was to go to 9:30 p.m. Thursday (during Farmers Market season), Friday, and Saturday, modify Sundays 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., with amplified music allowed 12:00 p.m.-6:00 p.m., and restriction on Sundays for construction tools. The motion failed.

Council Member Hughes made a motion to adopt the ordinance as proposed with change to stop time for amplified music to 9:30 p.m., and add the heavy construction equipment restriction on Sundays, the decibel reading being taken from the property line of the complaint.

On motion of Vice Mayor Young, seconded by Mayor Patterson, Council denied the Ordinance, with amendments allowing noise to go to 9:30 p.m. Thursday (during Farmers Market season), Friday, and Saturday, modify Sundays 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., with amplified music allowed only 12:00 p.m.-6:00 p.m., and the restriction on Sundays for construction tools, on a roll call by the following vote:

Vice Mayor Young stated the action required a \$136,000 subsidy from the City's General Fund (to the property owner's benefit). It is not fair to the rest of the City. The rates need to be raised. He was hopeful that Council would bring this back to do a study on the issue of raising the rates.

Council Member Campbell stated that all five of the L&L Districts were running at a deficit. Harris & Associates would bring a report back to Staff in late September 2018 with strategies and recommendations on how to eliminate the subsidies or balance the assessment revenues. It could be done before June 2019.

Mayor Patterson reviewed her request regarding an industrial safety ordinance (ISO).

Council Member Campbell, Hughes, Schwartzman, and Young disclosed exparté communications.

Chief Chadwick reviewed the staff report.

Organized Proponent: Industrial Safety Ordinance (ISO) Working Group (organized support):

Constance Beutel played a video covering the May 5, 2017 incident at the Benicia Valero Refinery.

Kathy Kerridge - Ms. Kerridge discussed concern regarding Valero's air monitors, the need for an ISO, how an ISO would benefit the City, and the lack of air monitors in the residential areas.

Pat Toth-Smith - Ms. Toth-Smith discussed the dangers of sulfur dioxide and the health risks that is involved with refinery chemicals, how an ISO would benefit the City, and the need for Valero to have a backup generator.

Rick Beason - Mr. Beason discussed concern regarding the lack of communication between Valero and the City of Benicia. He discussed the need for an ISO, how an ISO would benefit the City, and the need for citizens to know what steps Valero has taken to prevent events like the 5/5/17 incident.

Terry Mollica - Mr. Mollica reviewed a PowerPoint presentation (copy on file) in support of implementing an ISO.

Organized Opposition:

Bob Livesay - Mr. Livesay recommended Council go with option #2 and monitor it for six months. He discussed concerns with Mayor Patterson going beyond Staff and working with an outside group on this issue. Valero was not given a seat at the table.

Chris Robinson, Process Manager, Valero Benicia Refinery - Mr. Robinson discussed the need for the City of Benicia to work with all agencies involved in regulating Valero's operations. He discussed Valero's safety record, and Valero's desire to work with the City on future issues.

Leslie Sullivan, Operations Director, Valero Benicia Refinery - Ms. Sullivan encouraged the City to meet with the agencies that regulate their operations. She suggested the City meet with Valero regarding fence line monitoring. She urged Council to go with option #2.

Council Member Schwartzman and Ms. Sullivan discussed concern regarding what has been done to prevent future power issues, Valero's air monitoring plan, and how to ensure those are achieved without an ISO. Ms. Sullivan discussed the ongoing dispute with PG&E regarding the incident, and Valero's lack of ability to discuss the situation.

Elizabeth Burbon, Valero Counsel, discussed Valero's frustration regarding the lack of information they are receiving from PG&E. She offered to try and arrange a meeting with the City of Benicia and PG&E to try and get the answers.

Ms. Sullivan offered to have a side conversation with the City to discuss the technical plans Valero has in place regarding future power outages. They would need to involve people with the appropriate expertise. She and Ms. Burbon offered to sit down with the City and the Bay Area Air Quality Management District (BAAQMD) to go over the specifics of the approved air quality monitoring plan. Valero would be open to considering and discussing the issue of neighborhood monitoring.

Vice Mayor Young discussed concern regarding Valero's lack of explanation on what occurred and Valero's suggestion to discuss more details in private, out of the public's eye.

Council Member Hughes discussed the need to establish a better open and honest communication with Valero regarding the incident.

Cherie Cabral, California State Building and Construction Trades Council - Ms. Cabral discussed Iron Workers Union Local 378 opposition to an ISO. She requested Council allow the statutes to take place and work the way they are supposed to. Creating its own ISO would be duplicative for the City. She suggested going with Program Four.

- 5. Andres Soto Mr. Soto spoke in support for an ISO.
- 6. Dan Smith Mr. Smith spoke in support of an ISO.
- 7. Constance Beutel Ms. Beutel spoke in support of an ISO.
- 8. Citizen the citizen suggested Council wait and see how the State program turns out.
- 9. Citizen the citizen spoke in support of an ISO.
- 10. Craig Snyder Mr. Snyder spoke in support of an ISO.
- 11. Elizabeth Burbon, Valero Counsel Ms. Burbon spoke in opposition to having an ISO.
- 12. Christina Strawbridge Ms. Strawbridge discussed the need for an evacuation plan, for citizens to have more information in the event of a crisis, and the need for people to work together.

Council Member Hughes discussed the differences between an ISO and Program #4. He could not support the local proposed ISO. He asked Staff and Council to meet with the regulatory agencies to discuss the inconsistencies.

Vice Mayor Young and Staff discussed staff costs involved with an ISO, fee based ISO, the need for Staff to review the draft ordinance proposed by the ISO working group, BAAQMD's approved air monitoring plan, the proposed air monitors, and the Local Emergency Planning Committee. Vice Mayor Young discussed his frustration with Valero's not coming to the City to explain what happened and how they will prevent it from happening again. That discussion needs to be public. He would support moving the ISO forward, with direction to Staff to review the existing draft ordinance proposal that was prepared from the ISO working group.

Colby LaPlace and Jagjinder Sahota, Solano County Department of Resource Management, discussed the County's investigation and Program Four.

Council Member Schwartzman stated he was not ready to move forward with an ISO. Program #4 is close but missing a few things. The City and Valero need to work on communication, fence line monitoring, and community air monitoring. He discussed the importance of having an evacuation plan. He could not support this item moving forward at this time.

Mayor Patterson asked for confirmation that Solano County had not had any community meetings to discuss concerns regarding the 5/5/17 incident at Valero. She discussed the need for an ISO, her prior efforts regarding the City participating in AB 16, difficulties the City experienced with Valero during the 5/5/17 event, concerns regarding follow-through and follow-up, the community's right to know and participation, and the need to institutionalize the City's seat at the table to participate in the discussions and receive the reports from the regulatory agencies.

Council Member Hughes made a motion to approve Option #2 in the staff report, directing Staff to monitor Solano County's implementation of Program Four, directing Staff to meet with Valero and the appropriate regulatory agencies to address the few gaps that exist between Contra Costa County's ISO and Program #4, including more effective and frequent communications with the City, Valero, and the community, fence line and community air monitoring, an evacuation plan, and having a report back to the City Council the first meeting in November. Council Member Schwartzman seconded the motion.

Council Member Campbell would like to continue this issue for six months to get the air monitors installed and get the data back to Council. If that can't be done within six months, he would vote for an ISO. He would like the monitors installed and in place within six months.

Mr. LaPlace discussed the County's investigation process regarding the 5/5/17 incident and Program Four. Mr. Sahota offered to attend the Benicia Farmers Market to educate the public on Program Four.

Council Member Hughes stated he would be willing to amend his motion to include the 6-month limit for installing fence line monitoring. While that was going on, the community monitoring could be negotiated.

Council Member Schwartzman asked for clarification that the motion was referring to the monitors being in place per the BAAQMD's recently approved monitoring plan. Anything additional would have to be negotiated.

Council Member Campbell discussed the need for the City to be able to receive the same information the regulatory agencies receive.

On motion of Council Member Hughes, seconded by Council Member Schwartzman, Council approved Option #2 in the staff report, directing Staff to monitor Solano County's implementation of Program Four, directing Staff to meet with Valero and the appropriate regulatory agencies to address the few gaps that exist between Contra Costa County's ISO and Program #4, including more effective and frequent communications with the City, Valero, and the community, fence line monitors installed within 6 months (while that was going on, the community monitoring could be negotiated), an evacuation plan, and having a report back to the City Council the first meeting in November, on a roll call by the following vote:
